

What is Rory?

Rory is a learning resource for children of primary school age.

The resource pack is based on the Rory storybook which tells the story of a dog who is confused and upset by his owner Fred's unpredictable behaviour. Rory's life improves when he confides in his friend Felix who explains that Fred is behaving this way because he drinks too much alcohol.

Rory aims to build resilience and protective factors in children and encourages the exploration of emotions and importance of relationships and asking for help.

Rory has been independently evaluated and provides teachers with a range of creative resources and lessons linked to the curriculum for excellence.

A half day interactive programme provides learners with a mix of theory and skills practice.


On completing training learners will:
